Curricular Aspects

Curricular Flexibility & Implementation :

HEI follows the curriculum notified by KBC NMU Jalgaon as per AICTE & PCI norms, revised in 2018. Flexibility is ensured by implementation of CBCS/Electives. The principal as chairman of BOS and 04 faculties as members directly contributed for curricular development and revision. Faculty are involved in co-curricular design, implementation as well as university examination evaluation practices

Effective curriculum delivery :

Ensured through well planned procedures and executed in systematic manner through curricular/academic calendar, work load distribution, staff orientation, robust advanced time tables, LMS, continuous, internal and university exams and is reviewed for effective curricular transaction/delivery and evaluation. Review and monitoring are done by HOD, Academic committee, IQAC and Principal

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

Teaching, Learning and Evaluation is one of the most important components of NAAC Assessment and Accreditation for affiliated colleges. The performance of the college in the teaching and learning process and in the evaluation of student performance objectively, transparently, timely and continuously, will be perceived by the stakeholders to form an opinion on the college as compared to other colleges. Considering the special importance of this criterion in the assessment of the quality of an affiliated college, NAAC gave the highest weightage (350 out of 1000) out of all the seven assessment criteria. Technology interventions should be integrated into the process to prepare the students for future-ready. The entire system and processes shall be student-centric. The evaluation system should be designed in such a way that it measures the outcomes of the course/ programme. There shall be a mechanism to address the grievances of the students on the evaluation. The satisfaction of the students is of vital importance and the colleges should ensure that in all of its academic and administrative activities. Affiliated colleges should study carefully the key indicators of quality in this criterion and evolve policies, procedures, practices and special activities to ensure the highest quality in this.

Research, Innovations and Extension

Importance of the Criterion

Student Support and Progression :

Student support Student support strategies include facilitation of scholarship, capacity building, skill enhancement schemes, counselling, and coaching. During last 05 years around 50 % of students were benefited by govt scholarships/freeships.

Capacity building and skill enhancement :A dedicated training and skill development cell supports students with respect to Capacity Building, career counselling and guidance for higher studies. It arranges training for improving soft, computing and communication skills and ensures their overall personality development.

Career guidance, placement and progression :In the last five years, more than 65% of students benefited from competitive exam and career guidance with success rate of 50%. The placement cell conducts on/off campus drives with renowned pharmaceutical companies. In the last five years about 70 % of students were placed while 20 % advanced in higher studies.

Grievance redressal and committees : Anti-ragging, grievance redressal, antidiscrimination, and internal complaint cells address student issues.

Student activities and awards : Students actively participated in More than 25 sports and cultural events during last five years and fetched 15 state/national awards in sports/cultural activities.

Alumni association : A registered alumni association is contributing towards development of its alma matter in academic and student support activities.

Governance, Leadership and Management

The college administration is decentralized and different responsibilities and duties are delegated among the faculty. From 2020 onwards, KBC NMU is in the process of uploading students' mark sheets and degree certificates through the nad.digitallocker.gov.in platform through its affiliated colleges. The National Academic Bank of Credits (ABC) portal has now been integrated into the NAD portal https://nad.digitallocker.gov.in platform and is currently live from academic year 2021 onwards KBC NMU follows a choice-based credit system (CBCS) for all its programmes and is now in the process to pass a resolution related to the ABC in the Academic Council. Institute is in the process of creating centralised database of the college students. Through this database, where in the academic credits earned by the student from various courses will be digitally stored so that the credit earned by student previously could be forwarded when the student enters the program again. For monitoring ABC, proper technical support system will be created.</p>

From 2019 onwards departments are exclusively using Google Classroom for sharing learning contents with students for most of the subjects / courses. The faculty members also prepared themselves by getting trained for using various online platform for online teaching learning through FDP, STTP and workshops during lockdown period. Recently the institution has started using ITLE module of College Information Management System to make available all such type of e-content material prepared by faculty members to all students through online mode to meet the future challenges. 1.1.1 The Institution ensures effective curriculum delivery through a well planned and documented process.

Being affiliated to Kavayitri Bahinabai Chaudhari North Maharashtra University (KBCNMU), Jalgaon, the institute follows the curricular framework and structure prescribed by university in terms of duration, content, delivery, evaluation and certification. Students are following the syllabus of KBC North Maharashtra University (KBCNMU), Jalgaon which was framed by Board of Studies and Academic Council of KBC North Maharashtra University Jalgaon. Cumulative Grade Point Average (CGPA) and are implemented by North Maharashtra University, Jalgaon in academic years 2012-13. PCI syllabus is implemented in 2017-18. It is a four years degree Program conducted in eight semesters.

Syllabus specifies number of lectures and practicals in each course. The Teaching & Examination Scheme specifies the duration and marks of both Internal and External Theory and Practical examination.

As per the curriculum:

1. The two internal exam constitutes continuous internal assessment comprising of periodic tests and continuous evaluation.
2. The external exam constitutes end semester examination comprising of theory and practical.

As per the CGPA semester pattern curriculum, the percentage of marks for Semester and Internal examination is 80% and 20% respectively. As per the PCI syllabus curriculum, the percentage of marks for Semester and Internal examination is 75% and 25% respectively.

However, for effective implementation of the curriculum, the institution adopts the following steps:

A. Pre-Planning:

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reform

2.5.1 Mechanism of internal assessment is transparent and robust in terms of frequency and mode

Continuous internal evaluation is generally done on the basis of sessional exams, quizzes, homework, assignments, class test, projects, case studies etc. This ensures that the student answers the question in proper manner in the event of same question arises in the Sessional/end term examination. Sessional examinations are carried out per semester depending upon the scheme mentioned by University. After the internal exam the papers are evaluated by the respective staff The staff discuss the evaluated paper with the students individually, giving attention to area of improvement. The marklist of the subject is displayed on the notice board only after each student has seen their marks and are satisfied with it. In case of any discrepancy, the paper is re-evaluated by other staff in order to provide just evaluation. Provision is also made for students for improvement of Sessional marks by providing scope for improvement Sessional. In case of practicals, evaluation is done on basis of performance, attendance, viva voce as well as journal writing. An active grievance redressal committee ensures that the exam

related grievances are resolved in a time bound efficient manner. The students who perform well in academics are applauded for their efforts by awarding them with prizes during the annual social gathering

2.5.2 Mechanism to deal with internal/external examination related grievances is transparent, timebound and efficient

At College Level

After the completion of sessional exam, papers are evaluated and shown to the students. Any change of marks or entry of total marks are rectified by the subject teacher. Students have easy access to staff regarding correction of marks at college level. Prior to submitting the answer papers to the examination department, each staff ensures that any evaluation related conflict is resolved. An active grievance redressal committee ensures that the exam related grievances are resolved in a time bound efficient manner. Students are encouraged to voice their grievances without any fear of being judged/targeted by teachers.

At University Level

After completion of Semester exam, University usually declares the result after 40 to 45 days. University usually declares the result after 40 to 45 days of completion of Semester examination. Students can apply for online photocopy within 10 days after the declaration of the result. University provides photocopy of the assessed answer sheets to students on demand within a period of 30 days from the date of receipt of application. If students have any doubts regarding assessment of answer sheets then he/she can demand the photocopy of assessed answer sheet. Once the student receives the online photocopy of answer-sheet, the student consults with the respective subject teacher and takes his/ her opinion and then further processes for rechecking and revaluation is carried out within 10 days. The result of revaluation is declared within 45 days. If there is any change of marks, university makes the changes and if there is no change the marks are retained.

- The institute is situated with lush green campus with built-up area 6 acres.
- Institute is structured with four classrooms, and a seminar hall.
- The classrooms are equipped with internet, ICT teaching aids like LCD projector, smart board class and teleconferencing facility etc. Seating capacity is 60 students. Class rooms and seminar hall are well ventilated. Seminar hall of seating capacity 60 is equipped with 60 and internet connection. Seminar hall is utilized for conducting of guest lectures, training, conferences and workshops.
- Institute ensures availability of adequate physical infrastructure considering AICTE, PCI and KBCNMU norms.
- For UG and PG courses every department has dedicated laboratories. Total 16 laboratories are available including machine room and instrument room. Each laboratory is equipped with required experimental setups. Laboratories are adequately utilized and maintained. Adequate safety measures are available at each laboratory. Each lab is having student capacity of 20 per batch. Facilities like UPS backup and multiple circuit breakers are provided wherever necessary. Fire hydrant system is placed in building for emergency firefighting.
- Computer lab is equipped with 16 computers connected to internet via LAN. Students utilize computer lab for their projects; digital language lab software is available in computer lab.
- The common facilities like amphitheater are utilized in campus for conducting workshops and cultural events. Sport complex for outdoor activities is accessible to all the students.

The facilities for conducting theory classes are adequate. For the B. Pharmacy course, for each year, one classroom is separately identified; total 04 lecture rooms are available. All classrooms have one entrance door and 4 to 5 windows. Each classroom can accommodate a minimum of 80 students. The classroom is equipped with removable podium, permanent platform, chairs and desks. Each classroom provided with adequate number of tube lights, fans, green board and white

projection screen are provided permanently. The above amenities ensure proper ambience for teaching-learning process. As the strength of intake of students is 60, only one division is in attendance. Classrooms are provided with good ventilation with 4 to 5 windows and backup power supply of generator. Exams are conducted in the classrooms with CCTV cameras for monitoring the students in the classrooms.

In addition to classrooms, one tutorial hall is also provided. This tutorial room is used for handling separately for mathematics and biology class work if needed. In addition, discussions with students who are lagging behind the subject were also handled. The seminar hall / board room provided separately for conducting committee meetings and staff meetings

The activities of this club have resulted in establishment medicinal plant garden in an area of 0.60 ha with diversified species of medicinal plants for home remedies, rare and endangered species. Presently the garden maintains 612 number of species.

Nature Club "Greenland Saver" is organizing National Environmental Day celebrations every year in collaboration with Faculty members, Sant's, Acharya's through programmes such as tree plantation drive, awareness talks on the areas like River protection, Climate change, prohibition of plastic etc.

5. Evidence of Success

- Entire campus is green with diversified crop species. The campus has about 106 species of plants. All plants are maintained in student participatory mode. The students enjoy the greenery and are nurturing in a good oxy parlour and imbibing the green atmosphere in a self-motive drive.

Lack of technical knowledge in maintaining green atmosphere was addressed by imparting awareness talks by experts. Many of medicinal plants are not avail readily. 5. CONCLUSION

Pharm only, we have steadily expanded to an intake of 60 incorporating the course of not only M. Pharm, but also started Ph.D center affiliated to KBC NMU, Jalgaon with permanent affiliation of B. Pharm and 2F and 12B from UGC to the institution. The institution is recognized by PCI and three times accredited with NBA. We started our M. We began with old building and now have we developed exponentially in new construction with having over 11 labs and mostly smart classrooms with ICT-learning techniques. The faculty too has seen grown with approximately two-thirds of them now being Ph.D. We have the 04 UV-spectrophotometer, we have escalated now, possessing 3 HPLCs, spray dryer, 2 Brookfield viscometer, environmental stability chamber, BOD incubator, microwave synthesizer, 2 glass and other distillation apparatus in labs mini pilot-plant set up, 08-stationed dissolution apparatus and many other sophisticated instruments. We also achieved contactless admissions and payment system with Vridhhi software and atom payment gateways. The institution library enriched with various renowned pharma books, CAS abstracts along with online and offline journal subscriptions, specialized library software. We also have various experimental softwares like pharmacology softwares recommended by PCI, UV and HPLC data management softwares in labs.

Concluding Remarks :

We began in 1996 with a vision to nurture talents into all round excellence by providing high quality technical educational training in pharmacy discipline. Having rural and tribal area we anticipatedly achieved and got accredited by NBA three times as well as received 2(f) and 12(b) recognition from UGC. Our experienced faculty also takes additional efforts to try to fill any cracks that might be felt. They participate in over various committees for academic planning, anti-ragging, redressal, Alumni association, etc. ICT-learning strategies have been integrated to archive the curriculum outcome. Inclusion of sophisticated instruments (UV, HPLC, FTIR, etc.) make available to students for an impetus to research.
